PERMIT PROCESS FOR CANNABIS WHOLESALE PERMITS NOW OPEN



The Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority (SLGA) is now accepting applications for wholesale cannabis permits as well as licensed producer registrations.

Permitted wholesalers will be able to purchase cannabis from federally-licensed producers that are registered to supply the Saskatchewan market or from other permitted wholesalers operating in the province.

Wholesale permittees can only sell to retailers, not the general public, and must physically operate within Saskatchewan. There is no limit to the number of wholesale permits and no deadline to apply. Federally-licensed producers must also register with SLGA if they want to sell cannabis to Saskatchewan wholesalers or retailers.

That registration process is now open.

"Our government is committed to ensuring that the legalization of cannabis is focused on protecting the public," Minister Responsible for SLGA Gene Makowsky said. "Having SLGA permitted wholesalers and federally-licensed producers will help ensure that the supply of cannabis in our province is safe."

DO NOT GIVE AVA TRADE YOUR MONEY



The Financial and Consumer Affairs Authority of Saskatchewan (FCAA) has issued a Temporary Cease Trade Order against Ava Trade Limited, that appears to be operating an unregistered online platform that allows users to trade in FOREX and Contracts for Difference (CFD).

"An investor should always check to see if a company is registered to trade in the jurisdiction that the investor resides, before handing over their money," FCAA Deputy Director Ed Rodonets said. "A company's registration status can be checked by using the Canadian Securities Administrators' National Registration Search database at www.aretheyregistered.ca. Just because a company claims to be registered in a foreign country, does not mean they are registered everywhere."

GOVERNMENT INTRODUCES BILL TO SAFEGUARD SASKATCHEWAN'S ENERGY INTERESTS

April 23, Energy and Resources Minister Bronwyn Eyre introduced Bill 126, *The Energy Export Act*, for first reading in the Saskatchewan Legislature.

The bill responds to the inaction by the federal government to assert its jurisdictional authority to ensure the Trans Mountain Expansion Project proceeds. The bill will create the legislative framework necessary to optimize the value of Saskatchewan's oil, gas, and refined petroleum products. It establishes a permitting process for individuals or corporations seeking to export such products outside the province.

The new legislation will provide a means to advance Saskatchewan's key economic interests, including jobs, investment, industry revenue and activity in the energy sector. It is similar in intent to legislation recently introduced by the Government of Alberta.



JIM PATTISON CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL ON SCHEDULE FOR A LATE 2019 OPENING



Construction on Saskatchewan's new Jim Pattison Children's Hospital over 80% complete. With the interiors being finished from the top down, the fourth floor Neonatal Intensive Care Unit for #Saskatchewan's youngest and most vulnerable babies is virtually complete and moving through architectural inspections.

On the exterior, colourful glass fins are being installed on the building, giving the maternal and children's hospital a youthful and family friendly look. The crane, which has been a prominent feature in the Saskatoon skyline since 2014, is scheduled to be removed in May. The electrical grid will soon be activated and the provincial hospital is on schedule for a late 2019 opening.

SASKATOON FIRE DEPARTMENT WARNS OF ROTTING ICE



Warm weather has arrived after a long winter and is now causing ice on the City's lakes and ponds to deteriorate or rot. The Saskatoon Fire Department now asks people to stay off the ice since it may be unstable.

Assistant Chief Wayne Rodger says Saskatoon Fire Department staff have evaluated the ice conditions and have determined the ponds are no longer safe for recreational use.

"The degradation we're observing along the shoreline could make access treacherous," Rodger says. "Once the ice starts to deteriorate -- as it has this year -- the thickness of the ice is no longer an indication of its strength."

He says with warmer temperatures, several different factors come into play to make the ice unstable:

- When the snow cover melts, the sunlight and solar radiation travels through clear ice and is absorbed by the water below causing it to warm. Through this process the ice melts from the bottom up. The solar radiation causes ice crystals to deteriorate dramatically weakening the ice. Because this happens from the bottom up, even ice that appears stable may not be safe.
- When water pools on top of the ice, perhaps from the melting snow cover, it will be warmer than the ice and again allow solar radiation to travel through the ice causing it to melt faster.
- When water is moving above or below the ice surface, such as the inflows to our storm retention ponds from attached to storm sewers, ice will weaken. In the same way, river currents constantly affect the quality of the ice on the river making it unstable and dangerous for use.

The Saskatoon Fire Department again reminds residents to never go on the river ice and asks them to stay off the ice on the city's lakes and ponds for the remainder of the 2018 season.




