Keeping Saskatchewan Strong!

DIFFICULT BUDGET WILL KEEP SASKATCHEWAN'S ECONOMY AND FINANCES STRONG



Premier Brad Wall said the highlight of the spring sitting of the Legislature which wraps up today was a difficult but necessary budget that will move Saskatchewan away from its reliance on resource revenues and ensure the province's economy and finances stay strong.

"Some tough choices had to be made in this year's budget, but in the long run, making those choices now is better than kicking the deficit can down the road for someone else to deal with, like some other provinces are doing," Wall said. "We made the choice to meet the fiscal challenge now. That meant making some difficult decisions in this year's budget, but I am very comfortable that we have chosen the right course for the long-term fiscal and economic strength of our province."

Wall noted that cost-cutting efforts started at the top, as all ministers, MLAs and political staff took a 3.5 per cent salary reduction prior to the budget.

Wall said recent economic indicators show Saskatchewan's economy is showing signs of resilience. Employment is up through the first four months of the year, exports are up significantly and Saskatchewan has led the country in areas like wholesale trade, retail sales and building permit growth.

"Saskatchewan's diverse economy is strong and resilient," Wall said. "The decisions we are making today will ensure it stays strong into the future."

The government passed several pieces of legislation in the spring sitting, including:

- Legislation to reduce health care administration and better co-ordinate health services by amalgamating the province's health regions into one provincial health authority;
- Legislation to protect victims of domestic violence by allowing them to end rental leases early if necessary to remove themselves from an unsafe situation;
- Legislation to clearly define what does and doesn't constitute "privatization";
- Legislation to encourage investment in innovation through the creation of the first "patent box" incentive in North America;
- Legislation to improve pipeline safety; and
- Legislation to improve safety for tow truck operators by allowing flashing blue lights to be used on tow trucks.

During the spring session, Wall also announced that the province will use the notwithstanding clause to protect school choice, following a court decision that would force non-Catholic students out of Catholic schools and threaten funding to other faith-based schools.

The Great Sand Hills: Surprisingly, some of the largest sand dunes in Canada are in Saskatchewan. The Athabasca Sand Dunes, in the far north, are the largest active dunes in the country, and are perhaps the northernmost dunes in the world. As in, very far north — meaning they're also not that easy to get to.

The <u>Great Sand Hills</u> in southwestern Saskatchewan are much more accessible, being only a little over an hour's drive from the city of Swift Current. Covering 750 square miles, the majority of the Great Sand Hills comprises inactive or stabilized dunes covered in rose and berry bushes, sagebrush, cacti, and prairie grasses. Cattle graze on these dunes and are equally as at home in this desert-like landscape as the mule deer and pronghorn antelope that roam the hills.

The wind works waves into the sand, which shines white in the sunshine and reddish-gold in the evening. It's a peaceful place for a walk, and to watch the more than 150 species of birds in the area. You can try to capture an image of this seemingly endless expanse of sand and sky, but it will never all fit in the frame.

SASKATCHEWAN'S RETAIL SALES GROWTH ABOVE NATIONAL AVERAGE

Retail sales in Saskatchewan experienced robust growth in March in comparison to the other provinces, adding to recent upward trends in other economic sectors. Year-over-year, retail sales in Saskatchewan were up by 8.7 per cent in March 2017 compared to March 2016, to a total of \$1.7 billion—the second-highest percentage growth across the country and ahead of the national average of 6.9 per cent. The province saw an increase of 2.7 per cent in retail sales in March 2017 compared to the previous month,

ranking Saskatchewan third in percentage change among the provinces and, well above the national average of 0.7 per cent.

"These statistics indicate renewed consumer confidence in Saskatchewan and of an economy that is trending in the right direction," Economy Minister Jeremy Harrison said. "Our province is well-positioned to stimulate continued growth and activity in our key sectors, which is good news for our people and businesses."

All figures are seasonally adjusted.

1.1 BILLION DOLLAR HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION SEASON RAMPING UP



Slow Down Through the Work Zone

The Ministry of Highways and Infrastructure's budget is set for a near-record construction season that will see work continue on about 990 kilometres of provincial highways.

"This is the second largest transportation budget in our history, so we anticipate there will be many work zones going up across the province," Highways and Infrastructure Minister David Marit said. "We understand the summer season is a busy time for travel and motorists want to get to their destination quickly and safely. I want to stress the importance of keeping these work zones safe."

Construction projects are designed to provide a safe and efficient road network and, during the busy summer months, there is also a lot of highway traffic. Motorists need to obey signs and flag persons and

slow to 60 km/hr through the work zone. Drivers can also check the Highway Hotline for road construction prior to leaving for their destination.

"Work will continue on major projects like the Regina Bypass, Warman and Martensville overpasses, and Highway 7 and 39 twinning, so it's important to stay alert when entering any work zone," Marit said.



RECOGNIZING SASKATCHEWAN'S PUBLIC WORKS PROFESSIONALS

It is great to take this opportunity to recognize the hard work and dedicated service that public works professionals provide to communities of all sizes in Saskatchewan."

GOVERNMENT TO APPEAL SCHOOL FUNDING RULING

The Government of Saskatchewan will appeal last month's Court of Queen's Bench ruling on separate school funding.

"After a thorough review of the decision, we will be filing a notice of appeal to the Saskatchewan Court of Appeal," Justice Minister and Attorney General Gordon Wyant said. "In doing so, I hope we get further clarification on this matter that is vitally important for Saskatchewan families."

On April 20, the Court of Queen's Bench ruled on a legal challenge brought by the Good Spirit Public School Division. The Court held that Christ the Teacher Catholic School Division could not receive provincial funding for non-Catholic students. The Court ruled that the government must stop paying for non-minority faith students to attend separate schools.

The government disagrees with this ruling. If allowed to stand, the ruling would affect approximately 10,000 students who would no longer be funded to attend Catholic schools.

The government previously announced Saskatchewan will invoke the notwithstanding clause regarding the decision.

"We wanted to give students and their families the certainty that their ability to choose which school they attend will not be impacted by this decision," Deputy Premier and Minister of Education Don Morgan said. "Use of the notwithstanding cause will give parents that certainty, without having to worry about the outcome of an appeal."

SASKATCHEWAN'S MANUFACTURING SALES GROWTH LEADS NATION

Growth in manufacturing sales in Saskatchewan showed significant year-over-year strength in March, more than doubling the national average.



"The innovation and competitiveness of Saskatchewan's manufacturers have earned them a share of the global marketplace and put them on the leading edge of our economic growth," Economy Minister Jeremy Harrison said. "Leading the country in manufacturing growth is a testament to the strength and resiliency of our province's economy."

DATE EXTENDED, CHANGES MADE TO PST ON INSURANCE PREMIUMS



Following discussions with insurance industry associations, the Government of Saskatchewan has extended the effective date for the application of PST to insurance premiums from July 1, 2017 to August 1, 2017. The extension provides the industry with additional time to implement the application of PST and to address updates.

"The insurance industry associations have asked us for more time to implement this change and we want to ensure a smooth implementation," Finance Minister Kevin Doherty said. "We've listened and have agreed to move the effective date back one month as well as update the application of PST to ensure it is applied fairly across the industry."

Updates ensuring PST on insurance premiums is applied equitably include:

- applying PST to self-insured group arrangements, also known as Administrative Services Only (ASO) arrangements;
- exempting PST from individual permanent life insurance policies in effect prior to August 1,
 2017. New policies effective after July 31, 2017 will be subject to PST; and
- clarifying that any endorsements added to insurance contracts with an effective date prior to August 1, 2017 are not subject to PST.

With these updates, PST of six per cent applies to all insurance premiums with an effective date on or after August 1, 2017 sold by companies, agencies or groups where the insured person is a resident of Saskatchewan or the contract is for property located in Saskatchewan.

WHOLESALE TRADE IN SASKATCHEWAN SHOWS CONTINUED STRENGTH



In March 2017, wholesale trade in Saskatchewan grew 13.8 per cent (seasonally adjusted) over March 2016, above the national average of 10.2 per cent for the same period. Saskatchewan ranked third in percentage growth among the provinces.

"Wholesale trade continued to grow in March, and that shows that our provincial economy remains strong and resilient," Economy Minister Jeremy Harrison said. "Growth in wholesale trade points to optimism as wholesale trade statistics are known as a leading indicator of future economic growth."


