PREMIER MOE RELEASES NEW GROWTH PLAN



Growing A Strong Economy For A Strong Saskatchewan

November 14th, at a Greater Saskatoon Chamber of Commerce breakfast, Premier Scott Moe released Saskatchewan's Growth Plan: the Next Decade of Growth 2020-2030. The plan is a roadmap for a strong economy, strong communities and strong families, to build a stronger Saskatchewan.

"Our province has seen unprecedented growth since 2007 and this plan sets the stage for a strong, innovative economy that will drive that growth over the next decade," Moe said. "Our

government has always maintained that growth itself is not the goal; rather, growth will afford the ability to invest in a better quality of life for Saskatchewan families and communities. That is the purpose of growth.”

The new Growth Plan includes 30 goals for 2030, including key targets of a population of 1.4 million people, 100,000 new jobs, increasing exports by 50 per cent and increasing agriculture value-added revenue to \$10 billion.

In addition, other goals for 2030 include:

- Growing agri-food exports to \$20 billion;
- Annual private capital investment of \$16 billion;
- \$9 billion in potash sales;
- Increasing oil production to 600,000 barrels per day;
- Tripling the growth of Saskatchewan’s technology sector;
- Building and upgrading 10,000 kilometres of highways;
- Supporting communities through \$2.5 billion in revenue sharing; and
- Reducing surgical wait times to a three-month target.

The Growth Plan introduces new initiatives to help the province achieve its growth targets. Three new international trade and investment offices will be established in Japan, India and Singapore. These offices will help increase exports, attract more investment to the province and strengthen key trading relationships.

The Government of Saskatchewan is also introducing two new SaskFirst New Growth Tax Incentives. An agricultural technology incentive will support the application of emerging digital technologies and will help attract agricultural technology companies to Saskatchewan. A new chemical fertilizer incentive will encourage investment in Saskatchewan’s chemical fertilizer sector.

To help increase mining exploration and the value of mining exports, the province will reinstate Provincial Sales Tax exemptions for exploratory and downhole drilling activity.

The Growth Plan also affirms the government’s commitment to infrastructure by investing \$30 billion in infrastructure over the next decade. Specifically, the province will expand transportation infrastructure, invest in cellular and broadband infrastructure and build Saskatchewan’s export infrastructure.

The new Growth Plan includes 20 actions for the 2020s to ensure the province remains on track to

accomplish the goals set out in the Plan.

These include:

- Keeping the province's finance's strong and the budget balanced;
- Growing the population by keeping more young people in Saskatchewan and increasing immigration to the province;
- Maintaining a competitive tax environment and undertaking SaskFirst new growth incentives;
- Delivering on Saskatchewan's climate change plan to reduce carbon emissions;
- Reducing carbon emissions in electricity production and advancing the development of zero-emission small modular reactor technology using Saskatchewan uranium;
- Growing Indigenous participation in the economy through the growth of Saskatchewan's natural resource industries and labour market development; and
- Building strong communities by investing in infrastructure.

"Our province is blessed with the abundant natural resources, innovative industries and hard-working people necessary to continue our growth to 2030 and beyond," Moe said. "Through this plan we will build a stronger Saskatchewan that is home to a strong economy, strong communities and strong families."

REPORT FROM THE LEGISLATURE



November 14: Saskatchewan has a *Growth Plan* for the next decade.

The plan is a roadmap for a growing province of 1.4 million people and a strong economy with 100,000 more jobs.

The purpose of growth and our government's *Growth Plan* is to build a better quality of life for Saskatchewan people – to build strong communities and strong families – and to grow a stronger Saskatchewan now, and for the next decade.

Over the next decade, business and investment growth will create stronger communities, while adding value to the products we export around the world will support the growth of new industries and new investment in our province.

Technology and innovation will be a catalyst for growth in our core economic sectors and growing diversification of our economy. Growth will create new jobs and more opportunities for young people to realize their future in our province, while attracting skilled and entrepreneurial newcomers from around the world.

These are just some of the benefits of a growing province over the next decade.

Since 2007, the benefits of population and economic growth in the province have provided the ability to make substantial investments in infrastructure and services that Saskatchewan people expect in their communities. Strong growth has also provided the means to invest in better supports for seniors and vulnerable people across the province while reducing taxes and making life more affordable for Saskatchewan families.

While growth brings challenges, it also provides new opportunities to build on the investments that have been undertaken since 2007. Recognizing the importance of ensuring investments are affordable within a balanced budget, the Government of Saskatchewan will continue to invest in our communities and families to improve their quality of life as the province and economy grows over the next decade.

HEADS UP: DISTRACTED DRIVING PENALTIES ARE GETTING TOUGHER



The Cost Of A First-Time Ticket Will More Than Double; Repeat Offenders To Pay Even More

Drivers in Saskatchewan who make the unsafe decision to drive while distracted will soon be paying more for a ticket, with escalating fines for repeat offences within a 12-month period. Changes take effect February 1, 2020.

Driver distraction or inattention is one of the top causes of collisions, injuries and fatalities on Saskatchewan roads. In 2018, it was a factor in more than 6,000 collisions, 774 injuries and 22 deaths.

“Enough is enough,” Minister Responsible for SGI Joe Hargrave said. “Despite increased enforcement by police and significant awareness efforts by SGI, 22 people lost their lives on Saskatchewan roads in 2018 due to distracted driving or inattention. That is 22 deaths too many.”

GOVERNMENT TO SUPPORT LITERACY AND WORKPLACE PROGRAMMING FOR UNDER-REPRESENTED POPULATIONS IN SASKATOON



The Government of Saskatchewan announced funding toward literacy programming and workforce development for job seekers facing multiple barriers to employment in Saskatoon's labour market.

The Saskatoon Food Bank and Learning Centre will receive \$314,000 to administer the Creating Opportunities Strategy that supports under-represented populations in transitioning to employment. There are two programs offered through the Creating Opportunities Strategy - theoretical learning and applied learning. Participants will define career goals, create realistic action plans and improve on essential skills required for the workplace or classroom. Participants leave the programs ready to complete their education and/or find long-term employment.

“Programs dedicated to ensuring under-represented populations are able to successfully participate in Saskatoon’s workforce are fundamental,” Immigration and Career Training Minister Jeremy Harrison said. “Our government’s partnership with the Saskatoon Food Bank and Learning Centre continues to support our province’s most vulnerable people on their path to independence and assists in addressing poverty and hunger rates in Saskatchewan.”

PROVINCE PROMOTING TRADE AND INVESTMENT OPPORTUNITIES IN INDIA



Trade and Export Development Minister Jeremy Harrison will be advocating for trade and improved market access for Saskatchewan exports, and highlighting investment opportunities, during a trade mission to India November 16-23.

"India is the world's second-most populous country, with rapidly growing needs for food, fuel and fertilizer and Saskatchewan is well-positioned to help meet those needs," Harrison said. "Saskatchewan's major exports to India have increased in the first eight months of this year compared to 2018, and we know there are further opportunities to improve market access for Saskatchewan products."

Harrison will make stops in New Delhi and Mumbai during his first trip to the country. During his

mission, he will participate in the Indo-Canadian Business Chamber Annual National Convention in New Delhi and the Canada-India Business Council Mumbai Forum, in addition to meeting with representatives from the Indian government and industry.

WINTER WEIGHTS TAKING EFFECT SOON

Colder weather leads to benefits for the trucking industry as harder surfaces allow heavier loads to be shipped.

“As a land-locked province, the trucking industry plays a major role in getting our exports to market,” Highways and Infrastructure Minister Greg Ottenbreit said. “Winter weight season allows shippers to haul heavier loads on secondary-highways, resulting in fewer trips and cost savings for the industry.”

Winter weights are put in place annually from about mid-November to mid-March. Because the road bed freezes during this period, it is stronger and can withstand heavier truck loads without being damaged. Typically, winter weights allow truckers to carry up to 15-20 per cent more payload on secondary highways than what can be carried during the summer.

Restrictions on the winter weights can be in effect from November 16 to 30 and also from March 1 to 14. When temperatures rise and roadbeds remain soft, the ministry may remove winter weights in some areas. Commercial truckers and shippers are encouraged to check the status regularly at www.saskatchewan.ca/truckingweights.

Colleen MacPherson has been elected as board chair for Saskatoon Public Schools for the 2019-20 academic year following Ray Morrison's decision to not run again for the position.

MacPherson was elected to the position by her fellow trustees during the board's inaugural

meeting held Nov. 5. First elected as a trustee in 2009, she has served as vice-chair of the board four times and previously chaired the board's pension trustee and governance committees. MacPherson is the current chair of the Public Section of the Saskatchewan School Boards Association.

Ray Morrison had been board chair for Saskatoon Public Schools since 2006. He will continue as trustee for Ward 10 and has been elected to serve a six-month term as vice-chair for the board. Trustee Donna Banks will serve the consecutive six-month term as board vice-chair.

"I have been proud to represent Saskatoon Public Schools every day for the past 13 years, but it is time for someone else to take the reins. I know Colleen will be a strong voice for our school division at a time when public education couldn't be more crucial," said Morrison. "I remain a passionate advocate for our students and staff members, a dedicated representative for my Ward 10 constituents, and a proud supporter of Saskatoon Public Schools."

Morrison is the longest-serving chair of the Saskatoon Board of Education since its amalgamation with the Saskatoon Collegiate Institute Board in 1971. In her remarks during the meeting, MacPherson said Morrison left big shoes to fill.

"(Morrison) served with courage and commitment, never wavering in the belief that what's in the best interest of students is always our priority," said MacPherson.

UPDATE ON TEACHER BARGAINING

The Government Trustee Bargaining Committee (GTBC) continues to meet in good faith with the Teacher Bargaining Committee (TBC). Today's meeting with the TBC is the 10th meeting of the parties as they negotiate a new Collective Bargaining Agreement.

The main items that the Saskatchewan Teachers' Federation (STF) identified has been addressed either through the GTBC offer or through the Ministry of Education:

“This offer is fair and it provides stability for the teaching profession in this province for years to come,” Education Minister Gordon Wyant said.

The GTBC looks forward to continuing to work together with the TBC to reach a deal as soon as possible for Saskatchewan’s teachers.

NEW TOOLS HELP POLICE SERVICES ACROSS SASKATCHEWAN



Photo Credit, CJWW Government is providing more than \$680,000 for new policing tools and programming to police operations, community-based organizations and the Victims' Fund through the Civil Forfeiture Program.

Approximately \$340,000 of this will be provided to Saskatchewan police forces and community-based organizations. In accordance with legislation, a matching amount will be deposited from the Criminal Property Forfeiture Fund into the Victims' Fund.

“Police services and community-based organizations across Saskatchewan are taking action to make our province a safer place for everyone,” Corrections and Policing Minister Christine Tell said. “We are proud to support their efforts by funding new tools and programs that support safe and healthy communities.”

The police and community program funding will be used to provide for the following technology and programming:

- A research program studying Occupational Stress Injury (OSI) or PTSD (Saskatchewan Association of Chiefs of Police (SACP).
- Digital Vehicular Repeater Systems (Regina Police Service).
- Mobile Breath Testing Van (Saskatoon Police).
- Planning Together Project PRIDE Partnership (Moose Jaw Police Service).
- A domestic/family abuse program (Parkland Victims Services Inc.).
- Sexual Assault Review Committee (Sexual Assault Services of Saskatchewan).

IF YOU'RE GOING SOUTH, BE SURE YOU'RE PROTECTED



Winter is coming! If you're going to escape to the south, make sure you're protected.

Here are five ways you can protect yourself when booking a trip:

- When booking airfare, a hotel, or a car rental through a third party, confirm your booking with the actual supplier to ensure that the reservation was received and correct....
- Pay with a credit card. It's easier to get a refund through a credit card provider. But first, make sure you know what currency is being used (make sure you account for exchange rates).
- Minimize the use of cash or cheque deposits when working with someone on your holiday. It may be more difficult or impossible to get a refund if the third party goes out of business.
- Thoroughly read the cancellation policy set out in your travel contract. Make sure you know what to do in a worst-case scenario.
- Do research, read customer reviews, check with the Better Business Bureau and the Association of Canadian Travel Agencies (ACTA) to confirm that the third party is well established and has a good reputation.

**SASKATCHEWAN RECOGNIZES THE HOLODOMOR WITH A
SPECIAL SERVICE OF REMEMBRANCE**



Today, during a special service, Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan-Ukraine Relations Greg Ottenbreit, along with members of Saskatchewan’s Ukrainian community, commemorated those who perished during the Ukraine famine in 1932-1933.

“The horrendous acts that took place cannot go unrecognized,” Ottenbreit said. “For years their stories were denied and their stories were lost. Through this service we honour and remember the ones who suffered and the ones who perished. It is through remembrance we learn from the past and their memories live on.”

The memorial service was held in conjunction with Holodomor Memorial Week, November 18 to 24. A memorial candle was lit and will remain lit during Holodomor Memorial Week to show unity with those around the world marking the Holodomor genocide.

In 1932-1933, the Soviet Union imposed a man-made famine, killing up to 10 million people. Despite the record grain harvest, crops were confiscated and regulations were imposed preventing people from leaving their communities in search of food. Holodomor means “extermination by hunger” in Ukrainian.

As a permanent reminder of the tragedy, an exact copy of the statue entitled Bitter Memories of

Childhood by sculptor Petro Drozdowsky was officially dedicated on the park grounds of Wascana Centre in 2015.

The Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan was the first jurisdiction in North America to recognize this genocide with the passing of The Ukrainian Famine and Genocide (Holodomor) Memorial Day Act in 2008. International Holodomor Memorial Day is recognized on the fourth Saturday of November and this year falls on November 23.






