BUDGET REMAINS ON TRACK DESPITE DROP IN OIL PRICE

Saskatchewan remains on track to post a balanced budget in 2014-15. The Mid-Year Report released today, projects a year-end surplus of \$70.9 million.

"While the price of oil has fallen in recent weeks, it remained high for the first few months of the fiscal year, so overall, resource revenues are still projected to be ahead of budget this year,"

Finance Minister Ken Krawetz said. "However, it now looks like we will start the 2015-16 Budget year with a lower oil price, which means our government will need to carefully manage spending."

Krawetz said the Saskatchewan economy remains strong despite the impact of falling oil prices on government revenues.

"Right now, Saskatchewan has the strongest job growth and lowest unemployment rate in Canada," Krawetz said. "Most of the new jobs are not in the resource sector. They are in other areas, which shows the importance of a strong, diversified economy."

Saskatchewan's population is trending a little higher than usual as our province welcomes thousands of visitors from more than 60 countries. Agribition, Western Canada's premiere agricultural marketplace, trade show and rodeo, is underway. The traditional "burning of the brand" kicked off the annual livestock and agribusiness show which brings hundreds of exhibitors, thousands of visitors and the best livestock in North America to Saskatchewan.

The five-day event at Regina's Evraz Place features a full lineup of entertainment that includes the Junior Roping and Stock Dog competitions, the Canadian Cowboys Association Finals Rodeo and Full Contact Jousting. Other events include eight National Beef Shows, an Indigenous Agricultural Summit, Grain Expo Conference and, for the first time ever, a Think Ag Career Education Expo for students to learn about careers in agriculture.

Despite excess moisture this past growing season, Saskatchewan's agriculture sector is as strong as it has ever been. 2013 was our province's third consecutive year of record exports at \$11.7 billion and, in 2014, year-to-date exports are 19 per cent higher. Cattle prices have also reached record highs and the Western Livestock Price Insurance Program has been well-received with about 15 per cent of our province's calf crop covered in the first year.

Saskatchewan is well-positioned as an important agricultural trader in the world and expansion of trade relations will help to sustain and build on that. The Premier's trade mission to India this month is just one example of our government's work to promote growing these relationships.

GOVERNMENT MOTION SUPPORTS PIPELINE, SAYS ONTARIO AND QUEBEC SHOULD NOT BE CREATING BARRIERS

On November 26, in the Legislative Assembly, Premier Brad Wall introduced a motion supporting construction of the Energy East Pipeline and calling on Ontario and Quebec not to add unnecessary regulatory barriers to the approval process.

"The Energy East Pipeline will be good for the economy in all parts of Canada, including Ontario and Quebec," Wall said. "It means billions of dollars of new economic activity, new jobs and new tax revenue, with the majority of that new revenue and activity going to Ontario and Quebec.

"And yet those two provinces are creating new barriers, which will harm their own economies and the economies of western provinces who are net contributors to the billions of dollars of equalization payments Ontario and Quebec receive each year. It doesn't make any sense.

"In addition, moving oil by pipeline is far safer and far more environmentally-friendly than moving it by rail car, which is what we are doing now. Why would they oppose that?"

Wall said there is already a stringent approval process for new pipeline projects through the National Energy Board, yet Quebec and Ontario are now talking about inventing their own approval processes.

"This is not how Canada should work," Wall said. "We should be removing barriers to economic growth, not inventing new ones."

On November 20, during a commemoration service in the Legislative Building, Deputy Premier Ken Krawetz encouraged Saskatchewan citizens to remember Holodomor, a man-made famine that devastated Ukraine during the early 1930s.

"We shall never forget those in Ukraine who needlessly perished during this tragedy," Krawetz said. "I ask all citizens of our province to remember those who suffered during this time in

Ukraine, a country whose people came to Saskatchewan generations ago."

Krawetz was joined by members of the Saskatchewan Ukrainian community at the service, which included a candle lighting ceremony to mark National Holodomor Awareness Week. This year, the week occurred from November 17 to 23 with International Holodomor Memorial Day marked on Saturday, November 22.

\$10 MILLION REHABILITATION OF M1 CANAL UNDERWAY

On November 26, the provincial government announced construction is underway on a \$10 million rehabilitation of four kilometres of the M1 Canal and replacement of a major wasteway structure. This project will see the bed of the canal enlarged from 6.1m to 9.5m, which will help to increase the flow of water and provide a more secure source of water for users in the area.

"As Saskatchewan continues to grow, the sustainability of our water supply has become increasingly important," Minister responsible for the Water Security Agency Scott Moe said. "By rehabilitating the M1 Canal, we're ensuring there is a major source of water for not only the agricultural and industrial sectors, but many people in nearby towns, villages and Blackstrap Provincial Park."

AMENDMENT TO THE EDUCATION ACT TO ALLOW SCHOOL TO BEGIN BEFORE LABOUR DAY

An amendment to The Education Act that will enable the start of the school year before Labour Day when required was introduced in the Legislature on November 25.

Currently, in years where Labour Day falls later in the month - such as in September 2015 - a start date after the statutory holiday could result in the loss of instructional days for teachers and students, which can be difficult to make up later on in the year.

"This change is responsive to the needs of school divisions while also maintaining a consistent standard for the school year across the province," Education Minister Don Morgan said.

The changes to the Act will enable the school year to start on September 1, 2015.
