LARGEST QUARTERLY INCREASE IN POPULATION EVER RECORDED IN SASKATCHEWAN

Saskatchewan's population has hit a new all-time high of 1,057,884 people following the largest quarterly population jump ever recorded since Statistics Canada starting keeping quarterly population estimates.

Between April 1, 2011 and July 1, 2011, Saskatchewan grew by 5,444 people. This growth consisted of a natural increase (births minus deaths) of 1,524, net inter-provincial migration of 1,239 and net international migration of 2,681. Saskatchewan saw net in-migration from most other provinces including Ontario (641 people), Alberta (423 people) and Manitoba (147 people).

Premier Brad Wall said the new population numbers show the continued strength of the Saskatchewan's economy.

MORE NURSES AND DOCTORS WORKING IN SASKATCHEWAN

Saskatchewan is celebrating the addition of more than 900 nurses now working in the province than in 2007-08. This represents more than 80 nurses than last October when the provincial government met and exceeded its commitment to hire 800 more registered nurses and registered psychiatric nurses.

The majority of these nurses have been hired as part of the work under the partnership agreement between the Saskatchewan Union of Nurses (SUN) and the provincial government, signed in February 2008. Additional positions have been created by health regions.

While the SUN/government partnership agreement has met its goal for nursing recruitment targets, work continues on a number of important areas including:

- finding ways to keep nurses in the workplace longer;
- improving nurse/patient ratios and increasing the use of nurse practitioners;
- establishing a mechanism to make it easier for licensed practical nurses to become registered nurses:
- focusing on prevention and promoting wellness by using nurses in new roles;
- ensuring new graduates are offered full-time permanent employment; and
- expanding professional development and conducting patient exit surveys.

In addition, the government's physician recruitment strategy is showing results with nearly 200 more doctors now calling Saskatchewan home, representing an increase of 11 per cent over the past four years.

GOVERNMENTS OF CANADA AND SASKATCHEWAN INVEST IN RESEARCH TO IMPROVE DIALYSIS TREATMENT

On behalf of my colleague, the Honourable Jeremy Harrison, Minister of Enterprise Saskatchewan, I participated in an announcement at the University of Saskatchewan. New technology may soon be available to improve the quality of life for patients with End Stage Renal Disease (ESRD) by reducing the length and number of hemodialysis sessions.



An improved hemodialysis treatment system was announced today by Lynne Yelich, Minister of State for Western Economic Diversification and myself on behalf of Minister Harrison.

Our province is known as a leader in innovation and research and this new technology demonstrates our ability to be a leader in the medical industry and we anticipate it will make a positive impact on people from across this province and around the world!

Through the Canada-Saskatchewan Western Economic Partnership Agreement (WEPA), the Governments of Canada and Saskatchewan are investing a combined \$789,000.

Funding will be directed towards the development and commercialization of a product designed, fabricated and manufactured in Saskatchewan, suitable to be marketed to medical institutions throughout Canada and around the world. The new treatment system will be more efficient than current technology, reducing the frequency of hemodialysis treatments and time per session – a great advantage, particularly for residents in rural and remote communities.

The technology promises to improve quality of care and increase life expectancy in ESRD patients, while drastically reducing the costs of hemodialysis locally, nationally and globally.

Both Canada and Saskatchewan are contributing \$25 million each over four years to the Canada-Saskatchewan Western Economic Partnership Agreement to strengthen economic activity and improve quality of life in western Canadian communities.

GREATER SASKATOON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE LUNCHEON

r had the opportunity to attend the Greater Saskatoon Chamber of Commerce luncheon this week. Guest

speaker was Tim Cutt, President, Diamonds and Specialty Froducts, BHP Billiton. Timothy's current responsibilities include the ongoing development of the Ekati Diamond Mine, the execution of the Jansen Potash Mine Project and building a world-dass business for BHP Billiton.

EHP Billiton Ltd.'s ambition is to build new potash mines in Saskatchewan. The Jansen project, which is east of Lanigan, would be the largest potash mine in the province if developed, producing a maximum of eight million tons per year of the fertilizer staple.

The demand for additional mines in Saskatchewan is growing and EHP feels there is potential for more mines in our province.

EHP Canada's head office, which relocated to downtown Saskatoon from Vancouver earlier this year, continues to grow and is about 70 per cent staffed. The corporation has invested \$2

billion so far in its Saskatchewan potash exploration and projects.

Today, I attended another positive announcement at the U of S with my colleague, the Honourable Rob Norris, Minister of Advanced Education, Employment and Immigration.

The Provincial Government has committed \$3 million in new funding to create the Saskatchewan Innovation and Opportunity Scholarship program for post-secondary students, to match funding raised by post-secondary institutions through private sector and community-based partners.

"This scholarship will provide Saskatchewan students with additional opportunities to access the education and training they need to pursue their career goals and participate in the provincial economy," Minister Rob Norris said.

We have designed the Saskatchewan Innovation and Opportunity Scholarship to be responsive and flexible to meet the needs of students, while placing an emphasis on innovation and excellence," Norris said.

FLU CLINICS STARTING OCTOBER 11 ACROSS THE PROVINCE

The Government of Saskatchewan is encouraging residents to stay healthy this winter by getting a flu shot. Saskatchewan's publicly-funded seasonal influenza immunizations will be available across the province beginning October 11, 2011. As in the previous year, the publicly-funded seasonal influenza vaccine will be available, free of charge, through public health clinics and physicians offices to any resident who wants to receive it.

Vaccination is particularly recommended for persons at higher risk of becoming seriously ill with influenza such as adults 65 and over, persons with a chronic health condition or severe obesity, pregnant women and children from six months to 23 months (under two years of age). Vaccination is also recommended for individuals in close contact with those at high risk of influenza-related complications.

Pharmacies and some health care providers may be selling influenza vaccine directly or providing it as part of workplace health programs. Saskatchewan Ministry of Health will not reimburse individuals or businesses for influenza vaccine purchased privately.

To find the nearest flu clinic, residents can contact their public health office, physician, and regional health authority or call HealthLine at 1-877-800-0002. Information on clinics will be available on the websites of regional health authorities and information on this year's influenza immunization program is available on the Ministry of Health website www.health.gov.sk.ca.

ST. PAUL'S HOSPITAL RECEIVES \$6 MILLION TO ADD SURGERY BEDS

Province/Foundation Partnership Means More Surgeries for Patients.

Surgical capacity is expanding in Saskatoon to help provide patients with more surgeries, more quickly.

The Saskatchewan government is providing \$4.7 million for a new 18-bed surgical recovery unit at St. Paul's Hospital. The St. Paul's Hospital Foundation is contributing an additional \$1,975,000. The funding will help Saskatoon Health Region provide more surgeries and reduce surgical wait times.

The new unit will support the latest patient care and safety requirements. It will be designed based upon current standards for infection control and safety and will include 18 single-patient rooms with wheelchair accessible washrooms, patient lifts in each room and two negative pressure rooms. The unit will be designed using "lean" principles, meaning reduced steps and movement required by caregivers, and a streamlined planning and construction process resulting in a faster timeline than normal from initiation to completion. Planning sessions with frontline staff, managers, and support services were held in July and August to provide input on potential room and design concepts.

GOVERNMENT INVESTMENT IN HEALTH INFRASTRUCTURE REACHES MORE THAN \$732 MILLION

The provincial government has kept its promise to pump new capital funding into Saskatchewan's health system Health Minister Don McMorris said.

Since November 2007, the government has invested \$732.2 million in capital projects, including:

- planning and renovation/construction of health facilities
- advance funding for the Children's Hospital of Saskatchewan
- replacement of 13 outdated long-term care homes
- purchase of medical, surgical and diagnostic equipment
- building maintenance and repairs
- upgrades to safety and information systems

The Ministry of Health and health regions are also exploring innovative ways to improve the way health care services are provided, and the layout of facilities, using "lean" quality improvement methods. The adoption of such lean principles as simplifying processes, eliminating errors and focusing on the needs of clients helps ensure that the design and operation of health facilities supports the delivery of safe, high quality, accessible care in a cost-effective way.
